Seventh Heaven Project - leads the way

Join the workshop Seventh Heaven: a Project in Nordic Literature on Thursday 22 August and experience a creative approach to integrating immigrants into a new culture.

Gitte Vejlbj and Majken Jorgensen of Copenhagen, Denmark will introduce participants to the stories, mythology, songs and sagas from Nordic children's literature in a unique way.

Appealing to all generations and to all nationalities, the half-day program, Seventh Heaven: a Project in Nordic Literature, offers children and adults the opportunity to explore the literary landscape together.

Through readings, storytelling and dialogue, participants will be presented with



seven interactive areas of experience such as art installations, color, light, sound, music, scents, and variations in temperature.

The program objective is to arouse interest in the cultural, historical, social, and linguistic qualities in children's literature and also to encourage children's love of reading, fantasy and general education.

After the presentation a panel will discuss the feasibility of adopting similar programmes to facilitate the integration process of immigrants and refugees.

The workshop, presented by the Section on Library Services to Multicultural Populations, is scheduled to be held from 8.30 - 12.00 on Thursday 22 August.
