Library data in the world of machine learning: ethics, bias and algorithms

This session was held in the large meeting room and had hundreds of attendees. It was also livestreamed to a virtual audience. This session was focused on the ethics of using machine learning and AI tools in work with library data. The five presentations were: Automatic Extraction of Illustration Objects from Chinese Rare Books: A Machine Learning Approach, Ethical implications of working with metadata and artificial intelligence: how to build and develop skills in the ethical use of data, Ethical Implications of Machine Learning: An NLB Case Study on Predicting Patron Churn, Responsible Collections as Data, and SeTA@OP - semi-automatic indexing of EU publications; Combining the power of Machine Learning, Knowledge Graphs, and Human Intelligence. The presenters were from the United States, Chile, Singapore, and Luxembourg representing North America, South America, Europe, and Asia. This session was coordinated by: Cory Lampert, University of Nevada, United States, Vincent Boulet, France, and Caroline Saccucci, Library of Congress, United States.

Wednesday, 23 August, 01:30 pm – 02:45 pm

Utopia, threat or opportunity first? Artificial Intelligence and machine learning for cataloguing

This session was held in the large meeting room and had hundreds of attendees. It was also livestreamed to a virtual audience. This session was focused on practical cataloguing workflows using machine learning and AI. The three presentations were: Can generative artificial intelligence tools help librarians to catalogue?, What's in a Record? OCLC's Explorations in Using Machine Learning to Deduplicate and Enrich Bibliographic Data, One automatic cataloguing flow: tests and first results, and Is ChatGPT an Existential Threat or merely a bad dream?. The presenters were from Spain, Germany, Belgium, and the US representing North America and Europe. We had one accepted presenter drop out. This session was coordinated by: Cory Lampert, University of Nevada, United States, Ricardo Santos Muñoz, Biblioteca Nacional de España, Spain, Caroline Saccucci, Library of Congress, United States.

The Communication Team met 10 times and completed the publication of 2 issues of TILT. They are assessing the newsletter's impact and data shows an increase of issue consultation (for June 2021 there were 1288 and 3130 for June 2022). Social media is going well with good activity on Twitter (10289 impressions from WLIC2022 to the days before WLIC2023), improving activity on Facebook (1900 article views during first year). This team planned the 2023 Satellite Meeting at Erasmus University. We partnered with The IFLA Sections Continuing and Professional Development and Workplace Learning (CPDWL) and Subject Analysis and Access (SAA) Sections for this event.
